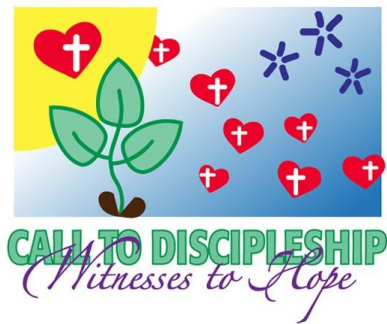

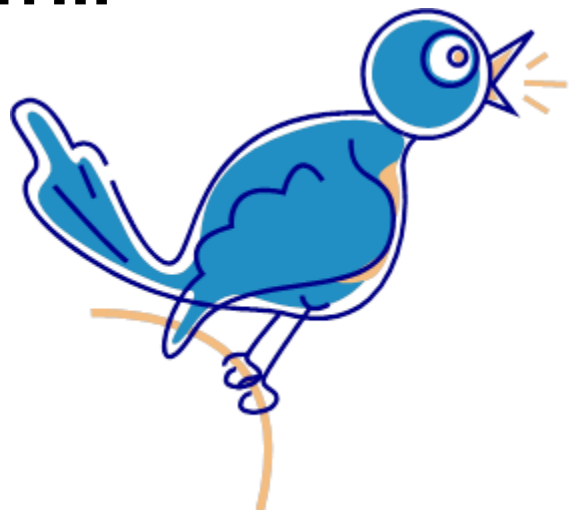
Hotel Accommodations

Conference Speakers



The National Association of Vocation and Formation Directors is pleased to announce Brother Sean Sammon, FMS as our keynote speaker. Brother Sean is a Marist Brother who has served his religious Institute as Superior General, Vicar General, and Provincial of one of its US provinces. He is past-President of the Conference of Major Superiors of Men in the US and for several years was the International Clinical Director of the House of Affirmation, a therapeutic center that offered psychological, renewal, and educational programs to diocesan priests and men and women religious. Sean completed his doctoral studies at Fordham University and is a licensed psychologist. The author of several books and numerous articles, he is currently a Scholar in Residence at Marist College, Poughkeepsie, NY.

Brother Sean will present 3 keynote sessions:

First keynote: THE JOURNEY THAT WE HAVE COME

This presentation aims at making sense of the last half century of renewal in religious life. Among the areas explored will be the nature of the world anticipated by those who participated in Vatican II and the world that actually unfolded during the years following the close of that historic gathering. The nature of change, times of transition, and the forces that are shaping the future of our Church and of religious life will also be discussed.

Second keynote: CHARISM AND THE WORK OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

This presentation will focus on the important role that charism plays in the process of renewal. At the outset, charism will be defined as the work of the Holy Spirit; participants will also be invited to consider the many ways in which that same Holy Spirit is active and alive in the work of renewal today. Other elements that need attention in the process of renewal will also be examined.

Third keynote: THE ROAD AHEAD

This presentation will focus on the steps that lie ahead for those congregations and institutes that believe they have a future. Issues such as community life in the 21st century, prayer and spirituality, lay partnership, and vocation promotion among young people today will be examined.



Sister Elizabeth Davis, RSM will facilitate the process used at the Conference.

Sister Elizabeth Davis is a member of the Congregation of the Sisters of Mercy of Newfoundland and Labrador. She is presently the Congregational Leader. She has a B.A. and a B.Ed. from Memorial University of Newfoundland, an M.A. (Theology) from the University of Notre Dame and an M.H.Sc (Administration) from the University of Toronto. Prior to 1982, she was a high school teacher in several communities in Newfoundland teaching Mathematics, English and Religious Studies. From 1986 to 1994, she served as Executive Director of St. Clare's Mercy Hospital, a teaching hospital in St. John's, Newfoundland. From 1994 to 2000, she served as the first President and Chief Executive Officer of the Health Care Corporation of St. John's, a regional health board which brought together eight teaching hospitals and health centres, a school of nursing and a regional ambulance service. She has been an active participant on board and system-wide committees and task forces in both the health and education systems. She is presently the Chairperson of the Canadian Health Services Research Foundation, and she is a member of the Medical Council of Canada, the Board of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, and the Board of Regis College (Toronto School of Theology). She is a member of the Mercy International Research Commission sited in Dublin, Ireland. She has served on numerous Boards and is a world renowned speaker and facilitator.

She served as one of three Commissioners on the *Royal Commission on Renewing and Strengthening Newfoundland and Labrador's Place in Canada* (June 2002 – June 2003). Among her recent awards are the 2001 Performance Citation Award (from the Catholic Health Association of Canada), the 2001 Award For Excellence in Distinguished Service (from the Canadian Healthcare Association), an Honorary Doctor of Laws from Memorial University of Newfoundland (May 2002), induction into the Alpha Sigma Nu Honour Society of Jesuit Educational Institutions (October 2003), and appointment as a Member of the Order of Canada (May 2004). Her most recent award was the Order of Newfoundland and Labrador in September, 2011.

Workshop Descriptions

1. “WHERE THE HEART’S DESIRE MEETS THE NEEDS OF THE WORLD”: VOCATION AND THE CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RESPONSE—Mary Rowell, CSJ

A commitment to social concern and action is “part and parcel” of what it means for each baptized Christian to fully live out his or her particular call to discipleship. Gifted by God’s love, it is about working through our “heart’s desires” to meet the urgent needs of our world. During this workshop we will reflect upon and discuss the faith-filled dynamic of Christian Social Teaching. Special consideration will be given to the numerous spiritual and practical ways in which each of us through our particular vocational commitments can share in this mission, often called the “Church’s best kept secret”, to bring about God’s “kin-dom” of love and justice in our world. We will also reflect on the importance of this Gospel call for those engaged in vocation and formation ministries.

Mary Rowell is a Sister of St. Joseph. Mary currently teaches Moral Theology and Catholic Social Teaching at the University of Toronto. She also leads retreats and is a spiritual director. Formerly Mary worked for many years as a nurse and nurse educator in the U.K. and in many countries in Asia in the fields of ophthalmology and blindness prevention. Mary is also a bioethicist and has worked as a clinical ethicist at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto. She continues in this ministry as a researcher for the Canadian Catholic Bioethics Institute. Mary is a Board Member of NAVFD.

2. VOCATION PROMOTION IN THE CONTEXT OF THE SEXUAL ABUSE CRISIS—Fr. Len Altilia, S.J.

What is the impact of clergy sexual abuse on the attitudes of those we seek to invite into our religious institutes and diocesan seminaries? An exploration of what we have learned.

Fr. Altilia was born in Toronto in 1947. After attending Catholic elementary and high school, he entered the Society of Jesus in 1964, was ordained in 1974 and pronounced his final vows in 1979. Father’s studies include a B.A. in Modern Romance Languages and Linguistics, and Philosophy, a B. Ed. and M.Ed, and an M.Div. For most of his life, Fr. Altilia was involved in High School education in Jesuit schools in Montreal and St. John’s, as teacher, Chaplain, Principal, and eventually President, and is now on the Board of St. Bonaventure’s College in St. John’s and on the school’s Jesuit Mission and Identity Committee. Since 1996, he has served as the Assistant for Vocations for the English Canada Province, and during that time also served as the Assistant for Formation (5 years), the Associate Provincial Superior (five years), and the Delegate for Allegations of Misconduct (12 years).

3. "TOWARD A SUCCESSFUL INTEGRATION WITH THE SEXUAL SELF"— Rev. Roger Keeler

This workshop will begin with a reflection on where we are today as a society: sexuality is not in what we canonists like to say is "peaceful possession." That being the case in the world around us, I suspect that the attitude is prevalent within the Church too, and met with a measure of fear and suspicion in houses of formation. By looking at sources like the Catechism of the Catholic Church and the "Theology of the Body" by Blessed Pope John Paul, we will begin laying a groundwork for a new way of seeing ourselves as sexual and moving successfully toward integrating this with the whole of who we are as women and men.

Roger is a native Edmontonian, born there in 1957. He attended Edmonton Catholic Schools first with the Ursulines of Jesus at St. Edmund's, then with the Oblates of Mary Immaculate at St. Francis Xavier High School. He completed a B.A. in History at the University of Alberta in 1978. In 1979 he entered St. Joseph's Seminary in Edmonton. Two years later he completed a B.Th. at Newman Theological College. He was ordained to the ministerial priesthood in 1984 and served first as Associate Pastor at St. Joseph's Basilica and Administrator of Our Lady of the Foothills Parish in Hinton, then as Associate Pastor at St. Theresa's Parish here in Edmonton. In 1986 he was made Pastor of Our Lady of the Prairies Parish, Daysland, with its attached missions. One year later he was appointed Pastor of St. Agnes Parish, Mayerthorpe, with its missions. He was also appointed Auditor at the Alberta Regional Tribunal. He began studies in Canon Law at Saint Paul University, Ottawa, in the autumn of 1990. It was that fall that he completed a M.Th. at Newman Theological College. He completed a B.C.L. and J.C.B. in 1991, and M.C.L. and J.C.L. the following spring. In August of 1992 he was named Pastor of Sacred Heart Parish in Edson where he remained until beginning my doctoral work at Saint Paul University/University of Ottawa the fall of 2000. In 2003 He was appointed Pastor of St. Michael-Resurrection Parish in Edmonton and began teaching canon law at Newman Theological College. He completed his Ph.D. and J.C.D. in late 2007. He is presently Pastor at St. Michael-Resurrection Parish, and serves as Assistant Professor of Theology at St. Joseph's College at the University of Alberta, teaching scripture and systematic theology.

**4. ONGOING FORMATION: AREAS OF INTEREST AND TOOLS—
Ray Douziech, CSsR**

This interactive workshop will attempt to consider a wide range of concerns surrounding ongoing formation and continuing education. We will look at transition to ministry from the perspective of the individual, the mentor, the local community, the leadership team and the wider congregation. Furthermore we will look at specific areas of attention: inter-generational communities; formation for formators; formation for leadership; and formation for multi-cultural living. Finally, the tools we have for ongoing formation for example, secretariats, workshops, assemblies, retreats, sabbaticals, and higher studies.

A native Albertan, Ray was involved in ministry in the Edmonton region for over 30 years. During this time he was active in the field of formation and education. He worked for 5 years with Edmonton Catholic Schools as a counselor and teacher. He also worked at Newman Theological College, the University of Seattle, the University of Alberta and St Stephen's Theological College as an adjunct professor. For 15 years he was the director of the Redemptorist Centre for Growth and did assessments for candidates to the priesthood and religious life. He also served as a formator for postulants and a member of the Redemptorist Formation Secretariat of his province. For nine years he worked with the General Government of the Redemptorists in Rome and for six of those years served on the General Secretariat for Formation for the Congregation. At present he is the assistant novice director for the International Novitiate of the Redemptorists of North America.

5. A DISCERNING HEART- AN OPEN SOUL--Ita Connery, FCJ

In a world of almost limitless possibilities and attractions, finding one's true call is a daunting task. This presentation will examine some practical methods based on principles found in the Ignatian Spiritual Exercises as well as practical examples from personal experience. Discernment as a way of life based on listening, noticing and reflecting on the many voices, feelings and magnetic pulls that operate on the soul in daily life will be examined. Time for reflection and experiential involvement will be provided and participants are encouraged to bring a decision for discernment.

Sr. Ita Connery FCJ has been in the ministry of Spiritual Direction and Retreats for the past twenty eight years. Trained in the Ignatian tradition of the spiritual Exercises and Discernment at the Jesuit Institute in Guelph, Ontario, Ita has worked with the Jesuits in St. Beuno's , North Wales, training spiritual directors, as well as directing two Tertianship programs for the FCJ Sisters. She has been on the staff of the FCJ Centre in Calgary for the past twenty three years. Her interest is in a wholistic approach to the person, combining her knowledge of Jungian psychology, Typology and the creative arts in her practice of spiritual direction and discernment.

6. INTRA-CONGREGATION AWARENESS AND COLLABORATION IN VOCATION MINISTRY—Paul Bednarczyk, CSC

Although most vocation ministers see the value of intra-congregational awareness and collaboration as essential to contemporary vocation ministry, how to do it well requires both skills and a common commitment to its goals. This workshop will outline the practical requirements necessary for religious congregations to work well together in successfully promoting religious life and in discerning with prospective candidates.

Brother Paul Bednarczyk, CSC, is in his 9th year as NRVC executive director. Prior to this position, he served in various capacities in his religious congregation as teacher, administrator, vocation director and provincial councilor. Br. Paul spearheaded the 2009 NRVC/CARA Study on Recent Vocations to Religious Life. He has also published extensively on vocation ministry and has been invited to give workshops in North America, Europe, Australia, and New Zealand.

7. SURVIVING OR THRIVING: SELF-CARE OF THE VOCATION/FORMATION MINISTER—Charlene Diorka, SSJ

Take care of yourself! You have spoken this phrase countless times but this time it's for you. This workshop will focus on balance, boundaries, self-care, and support so that one can serve in vocation/formation ministry from a place of abundance and hope. It will include internal and external stress factors in the ministry as well as healthy and hopeful ways of responding.

Sister Charlene Diorka, SSJ, is a Sister of Saint Joseph of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and is the Novice/Formation Director for her congregation. Prior to this position she served as the Associate Director at the National Religious Vocation Conference in Chicago, IL and as vocation director for her congregation. She has been a member of the Initial Formation Committee for the U.S. Federation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph and has accompanied young adults through retreats, discernment, and life choices. She has been published in *VISION* and *HORIZON*, publications of the National Religious Vocation Conference and *America* magazine. Recently she authored the chapter "Religious Life Today" in *Catholics on Call: Discerning a Life of Service in the Church*.

8. SHARING GOD'S INVITATION: HOW TO BUILD COMMUNITIES OF WELCOME—Billy Isenor, OFM & Pierre Ducharme, OFM

The call to discipleship – to vocation – in the Gospels is first characterized by invitation. Jesus intentionally invites people to “come follow me”. Through the act of invitation Jesus’ attitude is one of welcome. He creates challenging and life-giving space to draw people to God and to call them to Gospel living. The act of invitation to reflect upon personal and particular vocation is today often avoided or forgotten yet it remains an act of great importance. In a digital age we are gifted with many new and vibrant opportunities for invitation. This workshop will explore the creative uses of modern technologies to invite and to draw people to reflect upon and discern personal call ...to follow Christ in our contemporary world.

Born and raised in Penticton, B.C., Brother Billy has recently completed his Master of Theological Studies degree from Newman Theological College in Edmonton, Alberta. He and Father Pierre represent the latest class of Solemnly Professed Franciscan Friars in the fast growing Western Canadian Province of Christ the King. Brother Billy is a professional Chef by trade, and holds a wealth of life experience with conquering personal grief and relationship healing.

Well-read in theology and Franciscan spirituality, Brother Billy is also talented musician, artist, and published writer. Currently he is the assistant to the Post-Novitiate Director in House of Formation in Edmonton, where he also works in communications for his Franciscan community. Brother Billy has much in the way of experience with and passion for ministry to inner city poor, and the mentally ill. He is a gifted speaker and presenter of integrated theological concepts and is passionate about how to evangelize to potential vocations utilizing social media.

Pierre Ducharme, OFM was born and raised in Coquitlam, B.C. He studied Arts at Corpus Christi College and the University of British Columbia (B.A.), and theology at Newman Theological College in Edmonton (M.Div).

Fresh into Solemn Vows, Pierre is the youngest Franciscan Friar in Canada. He is a member of the growing Franciscan Province of Christ the King (Franciscans of Western Canada, OFM). He was just ordained to the Priesthood by Archbishop Michael Miller on May 14th, 2011, at Vancouver’s Holy Rosary Cathedral.

Father Pierre has a background in the arts of acting and public speaking, and is an avid blogger. His primary interests involve theology, and the practical integration of it –he believes that theology is but philosophy, if not grounded in human experience.

**9. RENEWING THE HABIT: CULTIVATING STUDY IN RELIGIOUS LIFE—
Darren Dias, OP**

This presentation examines the centrality of theological formation, both initial and ongoing, in religious life today. The presentation will first explore why cultivating the habit of study is constitutive of the mission of vowed religious and then the implications of study for ministry today.

Darren Dias, O.P. is a Friar of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans) assigned to Aquinas House, Toronto. He is a member of the Provincial Council and the Intellectual Life Commission of the Canadian Dominican province. Darren teaches systematic theology at the Faculty of Theology of the University of St. Michael's College, Toronto School of Theology. His areas of interest are Trinitarian theology, interreligious dialogue, Lonergan studies and the intersection of theory and praxis. Darren has supervised the professional degree programs and theological field education at the Faculty, but most recently he was responsible for curricular revision and assessment. He serves as academic advisor for religious pursuing the Master of Divinity degree. Darren's publications on religious life include: "The Echo of God's Voice: A Vision of Religious Life in the Thought of Timothy Radcliffe," and "Why Dialogue? Five Reasons Why Vowed Religious Should Make Interreligious Dialogue a Priority," *Religious Life Review* (« Pourquoi dialoguer et pourquoi faire du dialogue interreligieux une priorité?, » *En Son Nom*); and on theological education for ministry in *Teaching Theology and Religion*.

**10. SPIRITUAL GROWTH IN THE CANDIDATE FOR RELIGIOUS LIFE: LITURGY
AND DEVOTION—Archbishop Gerard Pettipas, CSsR**

Prayer is a *sine qua non* of the spiritual life. In the Roman Catholic tradition, a life of prayer is developed along two paths: liturgy (the prayer of the Church) and devotions. In this workshop, we shall examine the characteristics of each of these paths and come to an appreciation of their rightful place in our relationship to Jesus Christ and to His Church.

Born in Halifax, NS, Archbishop Pettipas was ordained as a Redemptorist priest in 1977, and served in many parts of Eastern Canada as director of vocations, novice master, member of a youth mission team and pastor. He was assigned as pastor of St. Joseph Parish in Grande Prairie, AB in 1999; from there he was ordained the Archbishop of Grouard-McLennan in northwestern Alberta in 2007.

11. MARKETING CATHOLIC WEBSITES—Brent Ducharme

Explore the peaks and valleys encountered by Catholic organizations seeking to break through the clutter and establish themselves online. We will examine the challenges of balancing tight budgets with high web standards. Join us as we investigate how to maximize your online potential through a highly effective website and productive use of social media. Unravel the mysteries behind Google and other Search Engines and learn what it takes to be found online.

Brent Ducharme is president and founder of Ducharme Designworks, a web and print marketing company based in Vancouver, BC. Brent has established himself as a leading expert on religious marketing with hundreds of corporate clients. His Catholic upbringing has presented him with the ability to combine his eye for design and technical knowledge with an understanding of the unique marketing needs of various Catholic organizations.

His accomplishments include the design and development of many Parish websites. He has worked extensively with Catholic Cemeteries of the Archdiocese of Vancouver, Catholic Independent Schools (CISVA), the Western Conference of Catholic Religious Education, Office of Religious Education, Catholic Educator's Conference, the Franciscan Friars of Western Canada, the Jesuits of Upper Canada, Corpus Christi College, St. Mark's College, Carey Theological College, Epiphany Sacred Arts Guild, the Knights of Columbus, and The Newman Association of Vancouver. 12. ENGAGING YOUNG ADULTS: COLLABORATION, COMMUNITY, GROWTH— Mechtilde O'Mara, CSJ and Vanessa Nicholas-Schmidt

Following on our 2010 presentation "Practical tools for young adults ministry," Faith Connections offers an interactive workshop on engaging young adults to build community and to deepen their faith. We shall focus on three of our initiatives: Eat Pray Share; Hike & Prayer; and Lenten Listening. We shall outline the objectives of each, its methods and its results.

Sister Mechtilde O'Mara, CSJ, Ministry Director of Faith Connections – has been involved with young adults for many years, primarily through teaching Classics to undergraduate and graduate level students, research on the Collected Works of Erasmus, and administration at St Michael's College and the University of Toronto. Currently she teaches Latin to students at the Toronto School of Theology. She also collaborated in an ecumenical volunteer programme which provided transportation and companion/assistants for physically challenged adults attending evening classes.

Vanessa Nicholas-Schmidt, Program Director of Faith Connections - As a young adult, Vanessa knows well the desire of young people to explore tough questions, grow in relationship, and engage spirituality. Vanessa began working with the Sisters of St. Joseph 5 years ago after completing her BA at the University of Waterloo. In that time she has supported over 1000 young adults on their spiritual journey. She is passionate about the work of young adult ministry and is excited to be learning more as she pursues part-time theological studies at Regis College.

Faith Connections - a young adult ministry of Fontbonne Ministries, Sisters of St. Joseph, Toronto – welcomes 18 to 39 year olds and those who work with them to explore and live the chrism of unity and community, by connecting to nourish their spiritual life, encouraging them to effect positive change, providing resources, and collaborating.
